EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Assessing the U.S. Treasury Department's Allocations of Funding for Tribal Governments under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021

The *American Rescue Plan Act of 2021* (“the Act” or “ARPA”) has resulted in the single largest infusion of federal funding for Native America in U.S. history. The core of this funding is \$20 billion for the more than 570 federally recognized American Indian and Alaska Native tribal governments. As required by the Act, the Department of the Treasury (“Treasury” or “the Department”) devised and has now implemented a formula for allocating these monies. We find that the allocations that have been made are grossly inequitable and contrary to the policy objectives of Congress, the Biden Administration, and the Treasury Department itself.

Treasury’s Formula: Apart from dividing \$1 billion of the available \$20 billion equally among all tribes, the essence of the Treasury Department’s allocation formula entailed distributing 65% of the ARPA funds for tribal governments based on the number of total tribal citizens served by those governments and distributing the remaining 35% based on tribes’ total number of employees, Native and non-Native, immediately before the COVID-19 pandemic struck.

The Result: ARPA’s \$20 billion of direct funding was intended to provide relief to tribes because Native American individuals and communities have experienced significant historical disadvantage and have borne significantly disproportionate harms from the pandemic. Correspondingly, within Indian Country, the tribes most in need of assistance are those where extreme disadvantage persists and where the pandemic has been most injurious to Native American individuals, families, and communities. Nonetheless, Treasury’s formula distinctly favored tribes with relatively high proportions of employees relative to enrolled citizens, which tend to be the tribes with strong pre-pandemic economies that financed modern infrastructure and well-funded public services. While these tribes deserve recognition for their accomplishments, they are the tribes that already were in the best position to “build back better.” Yet, Treasury’s formula has resulted in ARPA payments as high as \$880,000 per tribal citizen for some “have” tribes. Meanwhile, hundreds of “have not” and “have less” tribes, encompassing 89% of all tribal citizens in the U.S., have received ARPA allocations of less than \$10,000 per tribal citizen.

Policy Remedies: With the ARPA direct funding monies already distributed to tribes, options for remedying the evident inequities in Treasury’s distributions are limited. However, it still makes sense to:

- Create equity offsets by (1) targeting use of ARPA’s \$500 million Local Assistance and Tribal Consistency Fund to address the worst inequities, (2) prioritizing disadvantaged tribes in reconciliation, infrastructure, disaster, and other forthcoming funding measures and in other Departments’ funding for tribes, and (3) waiving bureaucratic restrictions on how tribes can use relief and recovery funds;
- Create a permanent and appropriately staffed and resourced Office of Tribal Affairs within Treasury in order to build the Department’s capacity and expertise; and
- Engage in substantive consultations with tribes that go beyond mere listening to generate useable knowledge and policy options.

I. Overview and Key Results

A. Treasury’s Task

Seeking to turn back the COVID-19 pandemic and “build back better,” President Biden signed the *American Rescue Plan Act of 2021* into law on March 11, 2021. With respect to the Indigenous communities of the U.S., the Act has brought “the single largest infusion of resources into Indian Country and Native communities in U.S. history.”² Specifically, the Act has allocated a total of \$32 billion toward addressing the pressing needs of Native citizens and tribes. Approximately \$12 billion is provided to various federal agencies – from the Indian Health Service and the Bureau of Indian Affairs to the Economic Development Administration and the Department of Transportation – which have responsibilities for serving the country’s Native population. Recognizing that the governments of the tribal nations now fulfill the roles and provide the services that we expect of state and local governments everywhere, ARPA also has directed the United States Treasury Department to allocate \$20 billion in the form of direct payments to the governments of the more than 570 federally recognized American Indian tribes.

Under tight, Act-imposed deadlines to distribute funds to the tribes, Treasury promptly set out the goals it sought to achieve with its direct ARPA allocations to tribal governments:

“These funds represent an historic investment in Indian Country and provide a substantial infusion of resources to help turn the tide on the pandemic, address its economic fallout, and lay the foundation for a strong and equitable recovery. These funds will:

- Support urgent COVID-19 response efforts to continue to decrease the spread of COVID-19 and bring the pandemic under control;
- Replace lost revenue for Tribal governments to strengthen support for vital public services and help retain jobs;
- Support immediate stabilization for households and businesses in Indian Country; [and]
- Address systemic public health and economic challenges that have contributed to the inequal impact of the pandemic on Tribal communities.”³

B. Treasury’s Formula

ARPA prescribed the contours of Treasury’s task in providing the \$20 billion of direct funding to tribal governments, requiring that \$1 billion be allocated equally across all of the federally recognized tribes and that the remaining \$19 billion be distributed in a manner determined by the Secretary of the Treasury to be consistent with achievement of the Act’s goals.⁴ Following “consultations”⁵ with tribal leaders, the Department set out its allocation methodology on May 5, 2021:

“Of the \$19 billion that the Act directs Treasury to allocate, Treasury’s allocation methodology provides that 65% of these funds, or \$12.35 billion, will be distributed based on pro rata, self-certified Tribal enrollment (“Enrollment Allocation”). Treasury will distribute the remaining 35% of these funds, or \$6.65 billion, based on self-certified Tribal employment data (“Employment Allocation”). For the Employment Allocation, an equitable minimum payment of \$1,000,000 will be made to eligible Tribal governments that confirm or amend their 2019 employment numbers.”⁶

Based on this methodology, the Department used (i) tribal citizen population (enrollment) data submitted by tribes to the Bureau of Indian Affairs in April 2021 and (ii) pre-pandemic 2019 employment data submitted by tribes to the Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) to distribute ARPA monies directly to tribal governments in a series of payments over May, June, and August 2021.

C. Treasury’s Result

In this policy brief, we assess whether the Treasury Department’s allocation of ARPA funds to the governments of the federally recognized American Indian nations has met the stated goals of the Act and the Department. We find that it has not. Measured against the standards of equity enunciated by the Department and the challenges of “turn[ing] the tide on the pandemic, address[ing] its economic fallout, and lay[ing] the foundation for a strong and equitable recovery,”⁷ we find that the Treasury Department has exacerbated, rather than ameliorated, what the Department itself notes has been “the inequal impact of the pandemic on Tribal communities.”⁸

Over the last several decades, federal policies of tribal self-determination through tribal self-government have proven to “work” in the sense that they have spurred widespread economic rejuvenation on America’s Indian reservations.⁹ Yet, this progress is distributed unequally and Indian Country is increasingly characterized by “have” and “have not” (or at least “have less”) tribes.¹⁰ A number of tribes have now prospered to the point of drawing equal with and even surpassing the economic development of their non-Native counterparts.¹¹ However, a far larger number of tribes are indeed raising the well-being of their citizens, but still find that the historic deficits created by decades of land loss, underfunding, and not being able to exercise their sovereignty are large and stubborn adversaries. In light of the demonstrable link between economic hardship and the severity of the impact of the pandemic,¹² these are the very

communities that Treasury asserted should be targeted because they “have experienced disproportionate impacts of the COVID-19 crisis.”¹³

Rather than targeting the most economically disadvantaged tribes and their citizens, Treasury has ended up doing the opposite. Treasury’s allocation formula particularly favors tribes with high numbers of employees (Native and non-Native) relative to a tribe’s number of enrolled tribal citizens. The results of the formula are nothing short of shocking. Being relatively small in population but having a large number of employees typically corresponds to a tribe that is doing very well economically, perhaps because of a large casino and/or other business(es) and operations that employ thousands of individuals.

Such conditions should not be begrudged. While favorable location relative to large markets often is a factor in these nations’ success, tribes that have built strong economies generally deserve credit and emulation for their wise leadership and sound governance. Tribal revenues have been used to substantially rebuild the physical, administrative, and human infrastructure of otherwise long-troubled communities, and many of their citizens are thriving economically and socially. Yet now, on top of these tribes’ pre-pandemic foundations of strong economic performance, job creation, and provision of well-funded public services, the Treasury Department has delivered dramatically outsized ARPA funding to their citizens. We report below that the Treasury Department’s formula for direct ARPA funding of tribal governments has resulted in allocations very much tilted toward the “have” tribes, with payments reaching as high as \$880,000 per tribal citizen in some cases. Meanwhile, literally hundreds of “have not” and “have less” tribes, encompassing 89% of all citizens of the federally recognized American Indian nations in the U.S., have received allocations of less than \$10,000 per tribal citizen.

II. Dissecting the Data on Treasury’s ARPA Allocations

Data on the U.S. Treasury Department’s allocation of direct ARPA payments to tribal governments on a tribe-by-tribe basis are publicly available at the website *usaspending.gov*. We have employed these data, checking them against the Act’s definition of eligible tribal governments:

“The term ‘Tribal government’ means the recognized governing body of any Indian or Alaska Native tribe, band, nation, pueblo, village, community, component band, or component reservation, individually identified (including parenthetically) in the list published most recently as of the date of enactment of this paragraph

pursuant to section 104 of the *Federally Recognized Indian Tribe List Act of 1994* (25 U.S.C. 5131).”¹⁴

In all, as of October 27, 2021, the publicly available data indicate that Treasury has made payments to 578 tribal entities. This total exceeds the oft-quoted figure of 574 federally-recognized tribes due to the fact that a number of tribes – such as the Minnesota Chippewa Tribe and the Passamaquoddy Tribe – consist of multiple funding-eligible self-governing sub-units (e.g., the Fond du Lac Band of Lake Superior Chippewa, Mille Lacs Band of Ojibwe Indians, White Earth Nation, etc. in the case of the Minnesota Chippewa Tribe). These additions offset the seven tribes which appear on the published list of federally recognized tribes but do not appear in the publicly available funding data.¹⁵

A. Stage 1 Payments: The Initial \$1 Billion

As noted above, the Act required that Treasury allocate \$1 billion of the \$20 billion in direct funding for tribal governments in equal amounts across all tribes. Based on its pre-disbursement estimate of the total number of tribal entities over which it would have to spread the initial \$1 billion, Treasury has made Stage 1 payments of \$1.64 million to each eligible tribal entity as of the date of this writing. In total, 578 tribes have received Stage 1 payments of \$1.64 million or, in a few cases, multiple payments of this amount, if the tribe is one of several that has multiple eligible governing bodies.¹⁶ In all, \$967 million has been disbursed to date. The slight discrepancy between this amount and the \$1 billion initial disbursement required by ARPA reflects logistical difficulties Treasury has encountered with attempting to transfer funds to a very small number of tribal entities, as well as a pre-disbursement overestimate of the total number of payments the Department would need to make out of the initial \$1 billion.

B. Stage 2 Payments: The “Enrollment Allocation”

In accord with Treasury’s adopted allocation formula described above, 65% of \$19 billion – i.e., \$12.35 billion – has been distributed to 578 federally recognized tribal governments based on each tribe’s pro rata share of total U.S.-wide tribal citizen enrollment. The data on each tribe’s population of enrolled citizens has not been made public by the Department. Nevertheless, the

enrollment figures submitted to the Treasury by a handful of tribes (e.g., the Navajo Nation) have been reported publicly.¹⁷

Under the assumption – asserted to be the case by the Department – that the Treasury Department based its “enrollment allocation” on *pro rata* distribution of the \$12.35 billion of ARPA monies, all enrolled citizens of all tribes would be treated equally. That is, a *pro rata* allocation would generate the same amount per tribal citizen across all tribes, and this per citizen amount can be calculated by dividing the total enrollment allocation by the population of any tribe for which the number of enrolled citizens is known – e.g., for Navajo. With the common-across-all-tribes per citizen allocation amount known, we can then calculate the population of any tribe for which enrollment figures have not been publicly disclosed by simply dividing a tribe’s total enrollment allocation by the known per citizen allocation. To illustrate, if the per citizen allocation amount is, say, \$10,000 and Tribe A received a Stage 2 enrollment allocation of \$20 million, Tribe A’s population in Treasury’s calculation must have been 2,000 (i.e., $\$20,000,000 \div \$10,000 = 2,000$).

With this framework in hand, we calculate that Treasury’s Stage 2 per citizen enrollment allocation across all tribes was \$4,655.66. This is the value that Treasury’s allocation formula assigned to each tribal citizen in its ARPA disbursements. at the aggregate level of tribes, the disbursed Stage 2 payments ranged from a low of \$13,967 (for the Alturas Indian Rancheria of California and the Telida Village Council of Alaska, each with calculated citizen populations of only three people) to a high of \$1,859,909,722 (for the Navajo Nation, with a citizen population of 399,494). The total population of enrolled citizens summed across all 578 tribes that received ARPA allocations implied by Treasury’s disbursements is 2,652,345.

Table 1a¹⁸ below shows the calculated populations of enrolled citizens of the 25 largest population tribes. Table 1b¹⁹ shows the same data for the 25 smallest population tribes. The population counts for all of the tribes are provided in the appendices.

C. Stage 3 Payments: The “Employment Allocation”

Under the Treasury Department’s allocation formula, \$6.65 billion of ARPA’s \$20 billion of direct funding for tribal governments has been distributed to tribes based on tribal employee counts. As noted, for purposes of its “employment allocation” the Department utilized information on the number of tribal employees submitted by the tribes to the Internal Revenue Service for 2019 (i.e., pre-pandemic). Total employee counts enabled the employment allocation to be made according to each tribe’s share of the total of all tribal employees across all tribes, subject to a floor of a minimum payment of \$1 million to each tribe if a tribe’s employee count was insufficient to generate at least \$1 million in employment allocation.

The IRS employment data used by Treasury record employees by quarter prior to the pandemic. Using pre-pandemic and quarterly employment information was appropriate. The former properly recognizes that it is tribal employment prior to the disruptions caused by the



pandemic that are most likely to reflect the economic conditions that ARPA seeks to “build back” to; and the latter properly can account for the fact that many tribes’ employment profiles are quite seasonal (e.g., varying with tourism or weather cycles).

Careful examination of the publicly available data for Treasury’s Stage 3 employment allocations of ARPA funds to tribal governments indicates that payments based on quarterly employee counts occurred in increments of \$3,654.69. Expressed in terms of full-time equivalent *annual* employees, this means that Treasury’s allocation formula has the effect of valuing an individual employed over the full course of a year at \$14,619.76 (i.e., 4 x \$3,654.69). For tribes with employment allocations in excess of the minimum floor of \$1 million, dividing each tribe’s employment allocation dollars by this figure yields each tribe’s total of full-time equivalent annual employees. Summing these counts up across all tribes with allocations in excess of the \$1 million floor yields a total of 435,331 employed full-time annual workers.

The foregoing figure is an undercount. It does not include the employees of fully 277 tribes that received the minimum employment allocation of \$1 million. The actual count of such tribes’ employees is not publicly available. Having received only the floor allocation, we do know that these tribes have relatively small numbers of employees: Based on Treasury’s valuation of full-time equivalent annual employees at \$14,619, a tribe with more than 68 such employees would have received an employment allocation of more than the \$1 million floor. It is reasonable to assume, however, that the low-employee tribes’ actual employee counts would be spread over a range from zero to 68. If we assume that the 277 tribes that received the floor payment all had 34 employees – i.e., the midpoint between zero and 68 – the total employment count across all tribes receiving employment allocation payments under ARPA’s direct funding would be 444,749.

Overall, Treasury’s employment allocation of ARPA payments to tribal governments ranged from the low of \$1 million received by the 277 tribes with full-time equivalent annual employee counts of 68 or below to \$363,959,229 realized by the Seminole Tribe of Florida (with 24,897 full-time equivalent annual employees). Table 2 (and Appendix 2) shows the top 25 tribes in terms of their estimated employment allocation payments received; the appendices provide the estimates for all tribes. It is striking that the substantial weight – \$14,619 per employed worker – given to employees under the Treasury Department’s allocation formula produces the result that one tribe has received an estimated 364 times more dollars than each of 277 of the tribes. We discuss the public policy implications of this disparity below.

D. Total Direct ARPA Payments to Tribal Governments

Table 3a shows the top 25 tribes in terms of their receipt of combined Stage 1, 2, and 3 ARPA payments. Table 3b shows the same data for the 25 tribes receiving the lowest amounts of total direct ARPA funding. The appendices report the data for all tribes. As indicated in Table 3a, at the top end are the Navajo Nation (at \$2,079,461,465) and the Cherokee Nation (at \$1,996,025,479). As we discuss in greater detail below, these substantial amounts arise *not* because these two tribes have very high numbers of employees relative to citizens, but because they have very large numbers of citizens (approaching 400,000 in both cases). at the other end of the spectrum, Table 3b shows tribes that generally have relatively small populations of

enrolled citizens. Here we note that even if they have small numbers of employees compared to many other tribes, some tribes have high numbers of employees *relative* to their populations of citizens. We turn to discussion of these cases now.

III. Public Policy Implications: What Are We to Make of Treasury's ARPA Allocations?

A. The Setting: Funding Backlogs and Deficiencies in Indian Country

We will not dwell here on the economic deprivations that have plagued Indian Country for so long. The deep roots of those deprivations are, of course, found in centuries of dispossession, overtly racist policies of disempowerment, colonialist programs of removal and resource and land confiscation, and the denial of Indigenous rights of self-governance and self-determination.

We and many others have documented economic and social conditions across Indian America immediately before the onset of the pandemic.²³ In certain ways, there were encouraging trends that had emerged. While immediately before the pandemic the average household income for Native Americans living on Indian reservations was barely half the U.S.-wide average household's income, under the last several decades of tribal self-governance ushered in by the *Indian Self-Determination and Educational Assistance Act of 1975*, average economic conditions on reservations have been improving, and improving much more rapidly than in the U.S. as a whole. Based on decennial U.S. Census data, the rate of increase in per capita income among Native reservation residents over the last 25-30 years has been five times that of the average American.²⁴

Notwithstanding this impressive performance, the economic gaps between Indian Country and the rest of the United States at the beginning of the self-determination era were so large that closing those gaps was taking time. It is proper to say that the glass may have been only half full, but at least it was filling. In fact, in some cases, there was truly outstanding progress being made against the scourges of economic disadvantage, as certain tribes' sound policies, capable self-government, and ability to take advantage of opportunities raised their citizens' economic well-being and social conditions to levels surpassing their non-Native, mainstream America neighbors. But, again, this pattern was not uniform, and rates of community development have differed widely among the "have" and "have not" tribes (or perhaps more accurately, the "have less" tribes).

To a very large extent, the differential levels of economic performance that have emerged across tribes over the last several decades have been the result *not* of differential leadership or self-governance performance: Although there are exceptions, both the "have" and "have less" tribes generally have put themselves on paths of sustained strengthening, albeit at different rates. Indeed, research repeatedly finds that the overall economic progress across Indian Country in the years leading up to the pandemic, however unevenly spread, is causally founded

on the noted federal policy of self-determination through tribal self-government.²⁵ The differences in performance across tribes have commonly been the result of differences in starting points and opportunities.

In particular, the progress being made in the era of tribal self-determination has not been all about casinos. Only about 5% of tribal citizens are from tribes that operate the mega-casinos (located through historical accident in or next to major metropolitan areas) that frequently are represented in the media. The vast majority of tribes are in rural locales with small to extremely small potential customer bases.²⁶

Nor has the overall economic rejuvenation of Indian Country been the result of federal largess that could have helped fund the infrastructure and other community needs and services upon which first-world economic advantage rests – needs and services that are often in greatest long-term deficit on precisely the rural reservations where economic disadvantage is most pronounced. Indeed, there is a common misconception in the mainstream public that the federally recognized American Indian nations, and even individual Native Americans in the U.S., are essentially dependents of the federal government, receiving outsized federal support. This misconception misses key essentials of U.S. federalism. It is *state and local governments* that have received outsized support from the federal government. As of 2019, the federal government’s Congressional Research Service (“CRS”) reported that:

“The federal government is expected to provide state and local governments about \$750 billion in federal grants in FY2019, funding a wide range of public policies, such as health care, transportation, income security, education, job training, social services, community development, and environmental protection. Federal grants account for about one-third of total state government funding, and more than half of state government funding for health care and public assistance.”²⁷

Moreover, the CRS calculates that, since 1970 (i.e., covering the period of devolution of basic governmental functions to tribes), federal grants to state and local governments have increased

373% in real (inflation-adjusted, spending power) dollars. Since 2000 alone, real-dollar federal outlays to state and local governments have increased 77%.²⁸

Meanwhile, the federal government's Commission on Civil Rights' 2003 report on *A Quiet Crisis: Federal Funding and Unmet Needs in Indian Country* "documented the federal government's historic failure to carry out its promises and trust obligations. These failures included longstanding and continuing disregard for tribes' infrastructure, self-governance, housing, education, health, and economic development."²⁹ Overall federal spending per person on Native American U.S. citizens was only two-thirds of the spending on the average U.S. citizen. In health, the comparable figure was 50%; and in education, tribal funding was only 50%-60% of the federal total spent on mainstream education. In the criminal justice arena, federal expenditures on law enforcement in Indian Country was only 80% of the level devoted to demographically comparable non-Indian communities.

By the time the pandemic hit, there had not been substantial improvement. Updating its 2003 report in December 2018, the Commission concluded:

"Federal funding for Native American programs across the government remains grossly inadequate to meet the most basic needs the federal government is obligated to provide. Native American program budgets generally remain a barely perceptible and decreasing percentage of agency budgets. Since 2003, funding for Native American programs has mostly remained flat, and in the few cases where there have been increases, they have barely kept up with inflation or have actually resulted in decreased spending power."³⁰

It was against this backdrop of federal policy and spending that tribe after tribe, at whatever differential – but overall positive – rates, had put themselves on a path of sustained economic and social strengthening by exercising sovereignty and taking advantage of whatever opportunities were available in their specific context. And then the pandemic hit. COVID-19 effectively shut down and shuttered the economies of the vast majority of tribal nations.³¹ In the

process, tribal governments' primary sources of funding (i.e., their own earnings from their own economic ventures), needed to meet citizens' needs during the pandemic, were decimated.³²

B. Addressing Issues of Equity in COVID Relief Funding

It is widely recognized that Indian Country has suffered disproportionately from the COVID-19 pandemic. This disproportionate impact is related to issues of economic hardship still prevalent in so many tribal communities.³³ In the same vein, responding to the pandemic is disproportionately difficult for those tribes that lack the economic wherewithal to have entered the crisis with rainy day funds or other sources of self-protection and to now make the investments in recovery that ARPA properly focuses upon.

Given differential capacity across tribes to recover from the pandemic, public policy in response to the crisis should concern itself with *equity*. In this context, we think that equity in ARPA allocations requires that policy provide disproportionately greater support to those otherwise least able to regain lost ground and “build back better.” These are the “have not” and “have less” tribes described above. Importantly, Treasury’s stated, before-the-fact policy objectives undergirding its allocations of direct ARPA monies for tribal governments embraced this ideal. The Department’s *Interim Final Rule* for its allocation formula was right on target in asserting:

“[T]he interim final rule aims to promote and streamline the provision of assistance to individuals and communities in greatest need, particularly communities that have been historically disadvantaged and have experienced disproportionate impacts of the COVID-19 crisis. Targeting relief is in line with *Executive Order 13985, Advancing Racial Equity and Support for Underserved Communities Through the Federal Government*, which laid out an Administration-wide priority to support ‘equity for all, including people of color and others who have been historically underserved, marginalized, and adversely affected by persistent poverty and inequality.’”³⁴

But how would such principles be implemented in ARPA’s direct payments to tribal governments? We have previously argued that the links between the impact and burdens of the pandemic, on the one hand, and economic hardship, on the other, would need to be accounted

for in allocating COVID relief funds.³⁵ The Treasury Department’s formula failed to do this. Instead, the formula focused solely on raw counts of citizens and employees. Moreover, the formula placed a particularly high value on the latter. In this regard, we believe that considerations of equity in the ARPA allocations require particular attention to allocations *per tribal citizen*.

Note that we do not take issue with Treasury paying attention to employee counts. There is certainly a case to be made for placing value on tribal employees in ARPA’s direct funding of tribal governments. The size of the tribal employee cohort reasonably provides some indication of the negative economic consequences of the shutdowns and other adjustments forced on *tribal governments* by the pandemic.³⁶ But the size of the employee cohort, if not offset in a formula by one or more factors that can capture economic hardship or its relevant correlate (i.e., COVID infection rates),³⁷ will tend to favor those tribes with the economic capacity to best weather the pandemic and build back better. Then, too, tribal employees as *individuals* have been provided numerous protections through other federal funding efforts, including extended unemployment benefits, rent and mortgage assistance, and direct CARES Act and ARPA compensation to individuals across the entire economy.

It is also relevant that ARPA’s tribal funds, the President’s Executive Order 13985 on *Advancing Racial Equity*, and Treasury’s own Interim Final Rule all have been explicitly aimed at *tribal* populations. In fact, it is important in this regard to note that the federal government has an enduring and special trust responsibility to tribal *citizens*, and that simply being an employee of a tribe does not invoke that responsibility.³⁸ It is perhaps telling that, among ARPA-relevant federal departments and agencies, the Treasury Department stands out for how little experience it has had in implementing the federal trust responsibility to American Indians and Alaska Natives.

We have previously reported that, at least among tribes with gaming operations, on the order of 70% of tribal employees are non-Native.³⁹ Particularly in small, “have” tribes, these employees generally do not reside on their employer’s reservation, and in some instances work in enterprises and operations that are far distant from the tribe’s reservation lands. From what is known regarding how tribes are spending their ARPA dollars, it is generally not the case that those dollars are going directly to employees, Native or non-Native, to compensate such workers for possible burdens they have personally borne since the pandemic began. Rather, tribes are spending the ARPA funds to support tribal citizens independent of whether those citizens worked for their tribe or not, and to pay for the kinds of in-community projects and programs that ARPA so clearly targets (including reservation infrastructure, health programs and facilities, on-reservation economic development, and tribal government services that have been attenuated as a result of the pandemic). The problem with Treasury’s actual allocation of ARPA direct funding for tribal governments (as opposed to the Department’s stated goals) is that such projects and programs are expensive, and the formula employed by Treasury ended up allocating funds disproportionately to those tribes already best able to bear program and project costs.

Figure 1 shows the amount of ARPA money that each tribe has received, measured by funding per tribal citizen and arrayed from the lowest ARPA payment per tribal citizen (\$4,872 in the case of the United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians in Oklahoma) to the peak payments (\$886,233 per tribal citizen in the cases of the Alturas Indian Rancheria and the Telida Village Council). The striking aspect of this distribution is the concentration of ARPA payments per citizen among a relatively small share of the Native population: Tribes receiving above \$10,000 per citizen account for only slightly more than 10% of the nation’s tribal population. This raises an obvious question: What are the characteristics of the tribes that received outsized ARPA support?

Funding Per Tribal Citizen: Distribution of the U.S.-Wide Tribal Citizen Population

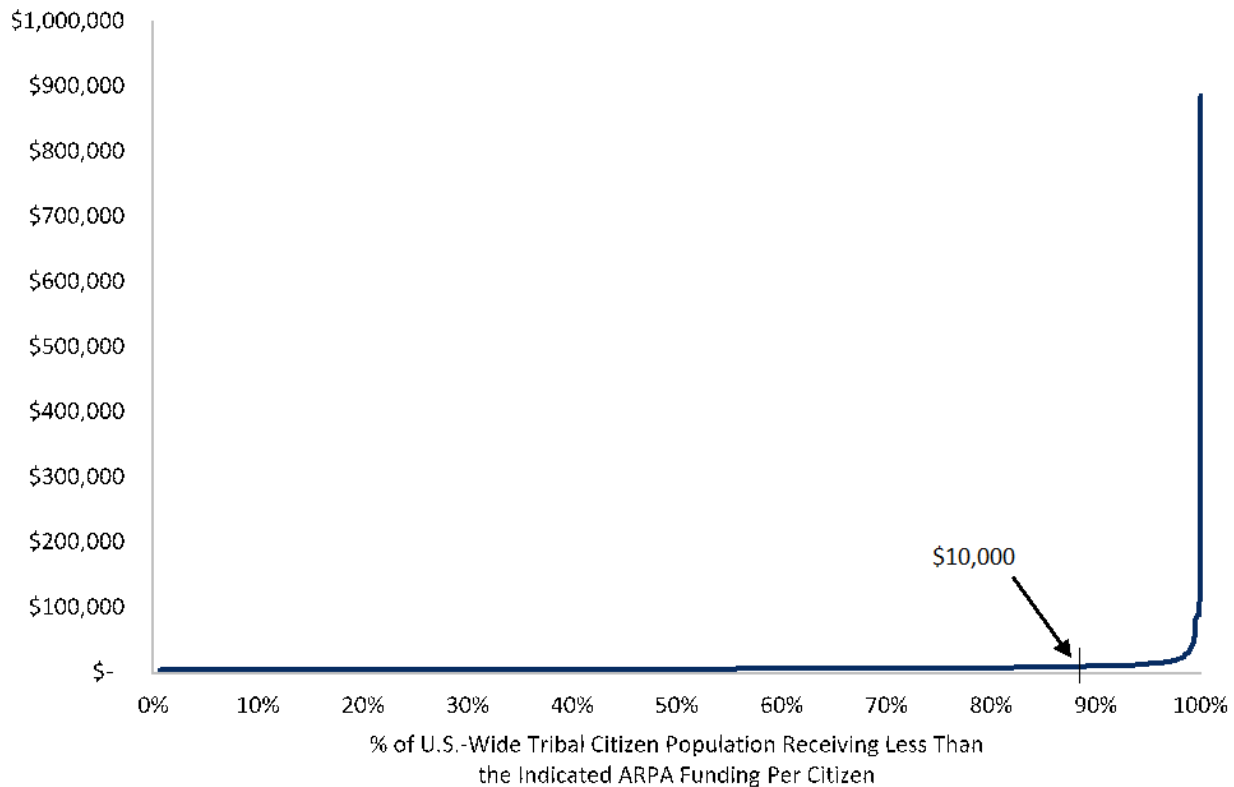


Table 4a shows the top 25 recipients of direct tribal government funding under ARPA, as measured by funding per tribal citizen. Table 4b shows the same data for the bottom 25 recipients of Treasury's ARPA disbursements to tribal governments. The full list of tribes, ranked in descending order, is found in the appendices. The pattern of very high ARPA allocations per tribal citizen in Table 4a is revealing... and disturbing. In a few cases (e.g., Alturas Rancheria, Telida Village Council), payments in excess of \$880,000 per citizen were the result of (i) very small tribal populations benefiting from the combination of ARPA's mandated equal allocation across tribes of the first \$1 billion of ARPA's \$20 billion in direct funding and (ii) Treasury's \$1 million floor on employee allocations. Overall, however, the pattern is one of very high per citizen ARPA allocations going to relatively small-population tribes with substantial employee counts. Not surprisingly, these conditions apply to a number of small-population tribes located in or near major metropolitan areas such as the Los Angeles-San Diego corridor and Minneapolis-St. Paul.

As noted above, these demographics mean that selected tribes find themselves in the heart of major markets for, e.g., gaming and other entertainment. Again, such tribes should not be begrudged in any way for their resulting economic wherewithal. When a small tribe is able to

sustain large employee counts, it is almost invariably because that tribe is governed well and has been wise and stable in its management and investments. Such tribes are the kinds of tribes that have been able to build up their infrastructures, fund the training and education of their citizens, and create first-class health and other social service programs and facilities. In many instances, such endeavors meant that while these tribes suffered economic losses from the closure of their businesses, the pandemic's effects were not as disproportionately visited on these tribes as compared to tribes lacking such strong pre-pandemic economic and social foundations.

From the standpoint of equity, the problem is not these tribes' success. The problem is that Treasury's allocation of ARPA monies was weighted so heavily toward tribes with high ratios of employees to citizens that it yielded ARPA payments to such tribes totaling hundreds of thousands of dollars per tribal citizen (Table 4a). Meanwhile, tribes with the opposite composition – i.e., high ratios of tribal citizen population to tribal employees – have ended up with very low ARPA support. Such citizen-to-employee characteristics are indicative of communities that are still struggling against widespread unemployment, low incomes, and limited wealth.

Thus, in Table 4b, we find some of the most economically challenged tribes in the country (e.g., the Crow Tribe of Montana, the Navajo Nation, the Oglala Sioux Tribe, the Cheyenne River Sioux Tribe, the Rosebud Sioux Tribe, and a number of larger population Alaska Native communities), as well as some of the tribes that have suffered the highest rates of COVID infection in the United States (e.g., the Navajo Nation). Yet, the Tribes in Table 4b were allocated absolutely and comparatively meager ARPA funds of less than \$6,000 per citizen. By so markedly tilting its ARPA allocations away from these kinds of tribes, the Treasury Department's formula ended up tilting pandemic recovery support away from precisely those Native communities that struggle the most under the legacies of long-term deficits of federal funding and the nation's historic exclusion, disempowerment, and dispossession of American Indians and Alaska Natives. Congress, the Biden Administration, and Treasury all intended for ARPA funding to help ameliorate these legacy disadvantages. *Treasury's ARPA allocation formula has done the opposite.*

C. ARPA and CARES Act Funding Combined

The *American Rescue Plan Act of 2021* was the second major federal effort to allocate pandemic relief funding to tribal governments. The first was the *CARES Act of 2020* (which also put Treasury in charge of devising and implementing an allocation system). In Tables 5a and 5b (and Appendix 5) we assess the overall cross-tribe pattern of combined ARPA and CARES Act funding for tribes. Specifically, we ask whether the overall effect of federal pandemic relief for tribal governments been more equitable than the ARPA portion of that relief. Unfortunately, the answer is no. As indicated in the tables, we continue to find that tribal citizens in relatively small tribes with relatively large employee bases have seen far greater contributions to their well-being

and the ability of their communities to “build back better” than tribes who have not been able to support relatively large numbers of employees. The top 25 (Table 5a) and the bottom 25 (Table 5b) tribes in terms of receipts of CARES Act plus ARPA direct support per tribal citizen are little changed compared to the top 25 and bottom 25 recipients of ARPA support only.

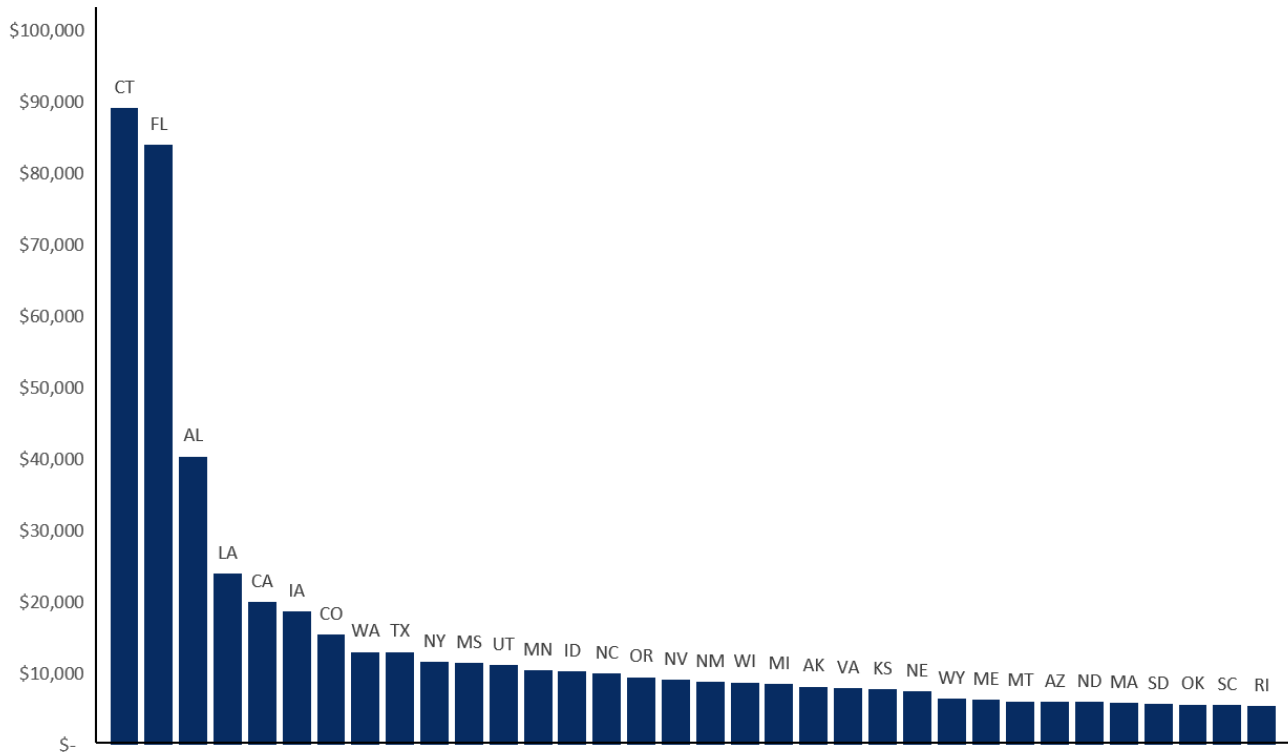
D. State-by-State ARPA Allocations

Finally, the overall pattern of tilting federal pandemic relief toward the “haves” is seen at the state level. Figure 2 reports per citizen ARPA payments to tribal governments by state. Not surprisingly, California – with large numbers of smaller tribes in markets ripe for gaming and other entertainment and tourism success – shows quite high ARPA funding per tribal citizen. On the other hand, states such as the Dakotas, where the bulk of the tribes are rural and are relatively large in population, show quite low ARPA support per tribal citizen. Thus, for example,

at just over \$20,000 per tribal citizen, ARPA support in California dwarfs the support provided in South Dakota (at \$5,709).

IV. Policy Remedies

The overall pattern of federal pandemic relief for the nation’s federally recognized tribal nations is disturbing in the gross failure of the Treasury Department to provide the greatest levels of support to those tribes and tribal citizens that have been most likely to be ravaged by the pandemic and least able to “build back better” from it. In its defense, the Department was hampered by limitations on the data at its disposal, tight deadlines set by Congress, and the reality that it was quite inexperienced in Indian affairs when it was suddenly charged, in 2020 and early 2021, to allocate billions of dollars across hundreds of communities about which it knew and understood very little. Indeed, it did not help that, unlike the CARES Act, ARPA did not require that Treasury work with the Department of Interior – with Interior’s greater experience in Indian Country – in devising Treasury’s ARPA allocation formula.

Notwithstanding these limitations, Treasury was able to directly query tribal governments and had access to important IRS information. The Department certainly ended up with access to



better and more data than any other single federal actor. It would have been prudent for the Department to examine the data before the fact for inequitable patterns in the way we have only been able to do after the fact. We surmise that a review of the type we have undertaken here was not performed by Treasury before it began to allocate ARPA monies directly to tribal governments.

Thus, we find ourselves with the ARPA direct monies for tribal governments already distributed in patterns strikingly inconsistent with the stated equity goals of federal pandemic relief and only limited tools for offsetting those patterns. Still, all that can be done should be done. Accordingly, we now set out recommendations for remedying the evident accumulated inequities we see in federal pandemic relief for tribes to date.

A. Offsets for Funding Inequities

Because the disparities across tribes in Treasury’s direct ARPA allocations per tribal citizen are so dramatic, and because it would be both improper and impractical to now “claw back” and redistribute monies that have been received and already are being spent, it would likely require billions of dollars of new funding to raise the funding for tribes shortchanged by Treasury’s formula to equitable levels. Assuming that path is blocked, there are nevertheless steps the federal government can take to remedy the inequities in allocating not-yet-disbursed funds.

First, Section 605 of the *American Rescue Plan Act* creates a Local Assistance and Tribal Consistency Fund under the Secretary of the Treasury. The Fund includes \$250 million per year in fiscal years 2022 and 2023 for support of tribal governments. These monies can be used for any governmental purpose other than lobbying.⁴⁴ They thus provide at least some means for offsetting demonstrable inequities in ARPA’s direct payments to tribal governments, and priority should be given by Treasury to the economically disadvantaged tribes that were most underfunded in Treasury’s ARPA allocations.

In fact, to maximize the positive impact of Treasury’s Coronavirus Relief Funds (“CRF”) and Fiscal Recovery Fund (“FRF”) funds, as well as other federal funds for which tribes are eligible (see below), attention should be given to eliminating bureaucratic hurdles and restrictions that limit tribal decision making over federal monies tribes receive. Reaping the benefits of tribal sovereignty discussed in Section III.A above is particularly important at this time.

Beyond Treasury’s direct allocations to tribal governments, numerous federal departments and agencies have received funding under ARPA that are to be directed to tribes and tribal organizations. In total, approximately \$12 billion is spread across the Departments of Agriculture, Education, Health and Human Services, Transportation, Commerce, Housing and Urban Development, and Interior, as well as to Treasury’s own Homeowner Assistance Fund and State Small Business Credit Initiative.⁴⁵ Programs under this ARPA funding are in addition to numerous other long-standing programs for which tribes and tribal organizations are eligible. Across all federal programs and in keeping with President Biden’s Executive Order 13985 on *Advancing Racial Equity*, it is now especially important that “[t]he Federal Government [...], consistent with applicable law, allocate resources to address the historic failure to invest sufficiently, justly, and equally in underserved communities, as well as individuals from those communities.”⁴⁶

B. Strengthening Treasury’s Capacity to Serve Indian Country

We have noted above that the CARES Act and ARPA have quite abruptly put greater responsibility for serving Indian Country on Treasury’s shoulders. Indeed, in terms of total dollars, Treasury now has arguably taken on the most responsibility of any federal department or agency. Through accidents of history and timing, the Department came ill-equipped to its new role as the federal government’s primary funder of the Indian nations. But the stakes are high for the historically underserved and disadvantaged Native citizens of the United States. Treasury is properly under pressure to quickly build its expertise and capacity to serve those citizens.

A first and positive step in this direction would be the creation of a permanent and appropriately staffed and resourced Office of Tribal Affairs in the Department of the Treasury. This proposal has bi-partisan support in Congress,⁴⁷ with a consortium of U.S. senators noting that:

“The Treasury Tribal Advisory Committee (TTAC), established [in 2015]..., plays an important role, but this body is not a substitute for a dedicated Office of Tribal

Affairs with a sufficient number of full-time, in-house personnel. Indeed, an Office of Tribal Affairs would likely help coordinate the TTAC's work."⁴⁸

Without investment in development of knowledge and expertise regarding the realities of Indian Country, current Treasury personnel can only struggle to keep up with mounting responsibility. Sound policymaking can only suffer and undesired unintended consequences can only flourish under such circumstances.

Lastly, toward the same end of improving the quality of decisions and policies coming out of the Treasury Department, its consultation processes must be improved. Fulfillment of consultation obligations should not be measured simply in hours of time spent in public meetings or number of speakers heard at such forums. Instead, productive consultation requires substantive engagement with tribes and experts from inside and outside the federal government who are knowledgeable on matters such as: data availability and use; demographics and differences across tribes; coordination and overlap with other federal, state, local and tribal programs; federal law and precedent governing sovereignty and federal trust and treaty obligations; and similar additional dimensions of the federal-tribal interface. Of course, such consultation and engagement can be expected to only be as useful as the Department's own internal capacity to process, understand, and integrate knowledge and perspectives gained into its decision making. In other words, consultation would be substantially strengthened by creation of a dedicated and fully staffed Office of Tribal Affairs.
